3 November: **Road to Nowhere? Brexit and the EU-UK Foreign and Security Policy Interrelationship – Prof Richard Witman**

Since the EU referendum vote in June, the majority of attention has focused on what might be the future economic relationship between the UK and the European Union, and the prospects for the UK's trade relationships with third countries once outside the EU. The future for the UK's foreign and security policy has been given much less attention.

Through its current membership of the EU, Britain participates in a set of policies that structure relationships between the EU and other states and organisations involved in international relations. With Brexit, this set of policies – covering trade, security (including defence), development and foreign policy will need to be recalibrated. Brexit also requires the UK to counter a view that Britain is opting for a reduced international role and influence. Defining the ambitions of a post-EU foreign policy will be a major undertaking for the next decade and a new European diplomatic strategy needs to be the first priority.

11 November: **Mitchell Lecture: Some Thoughts on Judicial Reasoning Across Jurisdictions – Rt Hon the Lord Neuberger of Abbotsbury**

The 2016 Mitchell Lecture will be delivered by Lord Neuberger, President of the Supreme Court of the United Kingdom. David Neuberger, Baron Neuberger of Abbotsbury, was appointed President of the Supreme Court in 2012, becoming the second person to hold the office since the Court was established in 2009 to replace the Appellate Committee of the House of Lords. He was called to the Bar in 1974 and made Queen's Counsel in 1987. He became a Bencher for Lincoln's Inn in 1993. Lord Neuberger was appointed Recorder 1990-1996, after which he was appointed a High Court judge in the Chancery Division. He was then the Supervisory Chancery Judge for the Midland, Wales and Chester and Western Circuits 2000-2004. In 2004, he was appointed a Lord Justice of Appeal, and in 2007, he was made a Lord of Appeal in Ordinary. He was Master of the Rolls from 2009 to 2012.

30 January: **The UK after Brexit EEA Plus/Minus? – Prof Carl Baudenbacher**

The UK's vote to leave the European Union in the referendum of 23 June 2016 has not answered the question of the future relationship between the United Kingdom and the European Union. One of the options floated during the referendum campaign, and since the Leave vote, has been for the UK to join the European Economic Area (EEA) – also known as the 'Norway model'.

The EEA extends the EU's Single Market to three other countries: Norway, Iceland and Liechtenstein. These countries are simultaneously members of the European Free Trade Association (EFTA). They are not subject to the jurisdiction of the EU's Court of Justice, but to that of the EFTA Court. This lecture by Prof Carl Baudenbacher, President of the EFTA Court, will explore whether the EEA model, or a variation of it, would be a suitable way forward for the UK after Brexit.

9 February: **Revisionist? Neo-Imperialist? Anti-Western? Deconstructing Russia's Policies in Ukraine and Syria – Dr Derek Averre**

Russia's alleged breaches of international law following the annexation of Crimea, and its apparent disregard for humanitarian considerations in its military support for the Assad regime in Syria, have damaged Russia's relations with the West to the extent that, according to one commentator, we are going through 'not just a spell of bad weather but fundamental climate change'. Concerns have been expressed about a continuing 'spoiler' role for Russia in European security governance and a 'sphere of interest' extending from Russia's western neighbourhood to Europe's southern periphery. This event offers a closer

examination of recent developments and analyses the opportunities and constraints Moscow faces in its foreign policy.

9 March: Ukraine, the EU and Russia: The Shifting Boundaries of Order – Prof Kataryna Wolczuk

The Ukrainian crisis is widely recognised as one of the gravest threats to peace and stability in Europe. This seminar will analyse EU-Ukraine relations by looking at different types of boundaries of order – various disjunctions that the EU (de-)constructs with non-EU countries in Europe, as argued by Michael Smith. The focus will be on geopolitical, legal and cultural boundaries. Particular attention will be paid to the role of the domestic regime in Ukraine and the role of Russia in re-shaping the EU's relations with Ukraine. In doing so, the seminar aims to dispel many prevailing oversimplifications and misinterpretations regarding EU-Ukraine-Russia relations, drawing on long-term and comparative research on the EU's eastern neighbourhood and Eurasian integration processes.

29 March: Studying EU Law after Brexit – Dr Leandro Mancano

The UK's decision to withdraw from the European Union has brought up many difficult questions on how both UK law and European law will need to adapt to reflect the new reality. Studying European law has therefore never been more relevant or essential for pursuing a European legal, policy or political career. In this open discussion, bring your questions and learn more about studying EU law, particularly at Master's level, at the University of Edinburgh.

29 March: Scotland: A European Nation – Fiona Hyslop MSP

This month marks the 60th anniversary of the Treaty of Rome, one of the foundational moments for the European Union. In this public lecture, Cabinet Secretary Fiona Hyslop MSP will reflect on this anniversary and discuss Scotland's place in Europe.

10 April: With One Bound We Shall be Free? EU Law after Brexit – Judge Ian Forrester QC

In this lecture, Judge Forrester will consider how EU legal rules would be applied in the UK after Brexit.

22 May: Future of the European Union – Elmar Brok MEP

The European Union today is faced with numerous challenges including, but in addition to, Brexit. In this public lecture, senior German and European parliamentarian Elmar Brok MEP will offer his perspective on the way forward for Europe.

15 June: EU Competition Law and the Information Technology Industry: Is the EU a 'Good Place for Business'? – Dr Arianna Andreangeli

Microsoft, Google, Apple, Amazon, Ebay, Intel, Uber: there is an endless list of technology-based companies which have developed new products and services that have revolutionised markets and the way we buy and sell goods and services. Innovation and technology are generally seen as positive and 'pro-competitive', generating economic growth and jobs, but equally they can also manifest themselves in ways that distort competition, lead to positions of market power and raise consumer protection issues. In a world of open and borderless markets, do individual governments and competition authorities have the tools to regulate disruptive innovation? What degree of regulation is required? How has EU competition law and policy developed to meet this challenge? How might this all change following Brexit? This workshop will consider these and related questions.

30 June: The Impact of EU Law on National Criminal Law Challenges and Constraints for Individual Liability – Dr Leandro Mancano

The aim of this workshop is to discuss landmark judgements of the Court of Justice of the European Union (CJEU) arising from the interaction between criminal liability at national level, on the one hand, and rights and principles protected by EU law, on the other. The analysis will focus not only on the relationship between Union norms and criminal liability per se, but also on the effects that the latter has on individual rights protected by EU law. We will evaluate the impact of the following decisions on EU and national laws by taking into account their substantive contribution to (1) the area concerned and (2) the definition of the rights at stake: C-387/02, *Berlusconi et al.* (Substantive criminal law – retroactivity of more lenient penalties); C-105/14, *Taricco* (Procedural criminal law – principle of legality); C-617/10, *Fransson* (Scope of application of the Charter – ne bis in idem); C-304/14, *C. S.* (EU citizenship – protection against expulsion and effects of criminal convictions); and C-61/11 *PPU, El Dridi* (Immigration – effectiveness of EU law and de-criminalisation).
